News From the City

- Richardson is the first city outside of Dallas to be served by DART light rail and the potential to have a positive impact on the city and both current and new residents is significant. The City engaged the Urban Land Institute (ULI) to provide guidance and recommendations related to Transit Oriented Development. Their report makes recommendations about the areas immediately surrounding the DART stations, about maintaining and enhancing quality of life throughout the city, and about the changes that are taking place in our city. You may request a copy of the illustrated and interesting 46 page report by contacting Joy Johnson, 972-744-4207. The report will also be available on the city's website in the future.
- The city has redesigned their website at www.cor.net. One new feature is the ability to review your water bills online, and even to see a graph of your utilization over the last year (it helps to have a fast Internet connection if you want to look at the graph). It also includes live camera shots of construction at Galatyn Park and a lot of other interesting information. The site will continue to grow and be enhanced significantly over the next few months.
- Richardson is the only local community that has committed to sidewalk repair in front of homes. Additional sidewalk repairs will get underway soon.
- The city is doing a survey on travel patterns around the city. While you are out, you may be handed a survey card asking about your destination or travel patterns to help with planning.
- The Wildflower Festival will be held the first and second weekends in May.
- The city is backing a bill in the Texas State legislature that will enable the police department to deal with oversize and unsafe trucks traveling within the city. Current regulations prohibit the city from dealing with these vehicle issues and require that they be dealt with only by Texas DPS. DPS has only three officers assigned to the county to deal with overweight and unsafe trucks. The bill that would permit the city to deal with these vehicles is Senate Bill 220 and House Bill 503.

City Council Candidates Forum

We are joining with the League of Women Voters and the American Association of University Women to sponsor a Candidates Forum on April 19, at 7:00 PM in the Grand Hall at City Hall. This forum will give you a chance to meet the candidates and to ask questions. Six of the seven incumbents are running for reelection and there are new candidates in most of the races. With the new convention and performance center, the inauguration of DART light rail, and other developments in the area, Richardson is at a critical time in its evolution. Your vote will be important.

The forum will be taped for rebroadcast on local cable TV, channel A14, and digital channel 14. Rebroadcasts will be Tuesday and Thursday nights, April 24th & 26th, May 1st and 3rd from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. Videotape copies of the broadcast will also be available in the library and Bernie Mayoff will have one copy that you can borrow. But it is more fun to be there so please try to attend the live event at City Hall.

Early voting begins on April 18 and Election Day is May 5. We'll look forward to seeing you at the Candidates Forum on April 19.

Pearce Bands Play at Meyerson



The Pearce High School Bands will perform in concert at the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center on Tuesday, May 15 at 8:00 PM. If you haven't had a chance to experience the Meyerson, this is an opportunity to enjoy one of the great symphony halls in the world. If you've only seen the Band at football games you're in for a treat when you hear what these skilled musicians sound like in a concert hall. If you've been to a past performance you know what we mean.

Traditionally a number of Pearce Band students attend college on music scholarships and several become music professionals. At this year's concert alumnus Tim Roberts, now with the U. S. Navy Band, will be a guest soloist. The Band will also be awarded the Sudler Flag of Honor for sustained outstanding performance as a high school band. This is a national honor for any band program and it isn't the first time our band has received this prestigious award.

The annual Meyerson concerts were originally funded through an anonymous endowment and now operate on a self-sustaining basis. On March 3rd, Richardson citizens voted in the School Bond Election. Our precinct, 1703, has 2582 registered voters. Three hundred, forty-seven (347) voters in our precinct voted. This was 13% of the eligible vote. For proposition one there were 279 for, 65 against and for proposition two there were 296 for, 51 against. **Although this is not a fantastic turnout, our precinct had the highest percentage turnout of any in the city!** Let's continue to lead the entire city for City Council and School Board Elections in May.

Wheeler School

Address: 400 S. Greenville Ave.

Marker Text: Kentuckian William J. (Uncle Billy) Wheeler came to this part of Texas soon after the end of the Civil War. In 1870 he deeded land to the Houston and Texas Central Rail-

way for the town site that became the city of Richardson and for the railroad right-of-way. In 1880 Wheeler provided a public school just northwest of this site for Richardson area children. After the Wheeler Schoolhouse burned in 1900, classes moved into a new, two-story, four-room, structure on this site. By this time the Richardson Independent School District had been created. In 1914 the frame schoolhouse was replaced with a two-story, red brick structure. The eight-room schoolhouse was staffed by five teachers. In 1927 two wings were added to house the increased enrollment brought about by the consolidation of the Richardson and Addison High schools. Further consolidation of surrounding common school districts in the 1930s and a population boom in the 1950s expanded school enrollment and created the need for other facilities. The red brick schoolhouse served only elementary grades from 1952 until 1960, when it began to serve as the district administration building. Texas Sesquicentennial 1836 – 1986.



Hill - Robberson House

Address: 2400 block of Plano Rd. near intersection of Plano and Lookout

Marker Text: Early Richardson settler A. H. Hill built this home about 1887 at 206 Sherman Street, on what had been railroad property. In 1902 it was purchased by Margaret A. Robberson for her daughter Virginia Bell Robberson (1870 - 1940). Known as "Miss Belle," Virginia taught school in the home for almost 40 years. The Victorian-style residence, which features a distinctive gabled roof and Gingerbread ornamentation, was moved to this site in 1979.


Richardson

Address: 411 W. Arapaho, south side of street - in front of City Hall and Civic Center

Marker Text: The town of Richardson can trace its beginning to an earlier community in this area named Breckenridge. Founded in the 1840s by settlers from Kentucky, Tennessee, and other southern states, Breckenridge was located south

of present Richardson. In 1873 the Houston and Texas Central Railroad was built through Dallas County, bypassing the town of Breckenridge. The citizens moved north to the rail line and named their new town in honor of railroad contractor E. H. Richardson. Land for a townsite was donated by William J. Wheeler and Bernard Reilly. The new town grew quickly. With its main street facing the railroad tracks, it soon boasted homes, businesses, schools and churches.. By the 1890s Richardson was an important shipping point for area grain and cotton. The town was incorporated in 1925 and Thomas F. McKamy was elected Mayor. The 1930 U. S. Census showed a population of 629. Following World War II, the town's economic base changed from agriculture to electronics and manufacturing. Experiencing rapid growth after the 1950s, Richardson's population had passed 75,000 by 1990.



A Bridge to the Future



You may have noticed surveyors' flags in the area around Melrose and Cheyenne. We're going to get a new, more attractive and safer bridge over Cottonwood Creek!

Many of us are barely even aware that Melrose actually crosses Cottonwood Creek just east of Cheyenne and that there are some rather plain rails to prevent anyone from falling into the creek. The new bridge will have an entirely new look and become an attractive part of the local scenery. The new bridge style will be a combination of decorative concrete and stonework. The culvert under the current roadway will be removed and an actual bridge will be built to provide better water flow. The sidewalks across the bridge will be six feet wide, instead of the current three foot width, creating a safer and more attractive environment. Stonework at the end of the bridge will curve away to ensure safe visibility for pedestrians and for motorists.

Design work for the new bridge was contracted in February and the design phase of the project is currently approximately 30% complete. The project is scheduled to begin construction in spring 2002. The project is funded by the existing bond program. The roadway will have to be closed for a while during the actual construction.

The Crime Prevention Corner

This is the fourth and last part of a series on a very important topic, Protecting Our Kids from Crime and Violence. The source material is compliments of the National Crime Prevention Council.

Protecting Your Child Against Sexual Abuse

- Let your child know that he or she can tell you ANYTHING, and that you will always be supportive.
- Teach your child that NO ONE, not even a teacher or a close relative, has the right to touch him or her in a way that feels uncomfortable. Let them know that it is OK to say no, get away, and tell a trusted adult.
- Don't force kids to kiss or hug or sit on a grown up's lap if they don't want to. This gives them control and teaches them that they will always have the right to refuse.
- Tell your child to stay away from strangers who hang around playgrounds, public restrooms, and schools.
- Be alert for changes in your child's behavior that could signal sexual abuse; sudden secretiveness, withdrawal from activities, refusal to go to school, unexplained hostility toward a favorite baby sitter or relative, and increased anxiety.

Crime Talk

Hopefully most of you are aware that there was a forced entry burglary in JJPHOA on March 27. We immediately updated the Information Line (972-545-1776) recording and deployed the Information Line Crime Alert signs at all nine entrances to our neighborhood. We also sent a Crime Alert message to eGroups subscribers (free) and notified the Crime Watch Coordinators.

The front door of a residence in the 1200 block

of Huntington was forced open and some property was taken. The residence was unoccupied at the time; around 5:00 PM. I am not certain, but I don't believe that an alarm system was in use or a deadbolt lock engaged.

The above scenario is characteristic of the burglaries we had last fall, and of a recent series of burglaries just south of us in the Reservation HOA. It appears that one or more perpetrators ring and knock vigorously to see if anyone answers the door. If someone does, they give a weak excuse and leave. If no one answers the door, then they attempt forced entry of the apparently unoccupied residence, often successfully.

Since my last column, there was also another theft from an open garage. This time, an edger and lawnmower were taken from the open garage in the 1100 block of Chesterton sometime between 9 AM and 1:30 PM.

I hate to sound like a broken record, but you can significantly reduce your chances of being victimized in the ways described above by simply engaging your deadbolt lock if you are away, and keeping your garage door shut when you are not present, even if you are only inside getting some lunch, or around front mowing the lawn. The people that do these are very fast, and very bold.

A 1994 White Plymouth Voyager was apparently stolen from in front of the owner's house in the 1200 block of Eton, between 4 PM (4/8) and 10 AM (4/9). The owner heard dogs barking feverishly at 6 AM and suspects that was when the van was stolen.

RPD Auto Theft has noticed a minor trend (six stolen since 12/06/00) in thefts of early 90's model Voyagers, Caravans and Town and Country minivans. Apparently, they are easy to steal. This is a good reason for an owner to consider installing an anti-theft device, such as an ignition kill switch, or fuel line cut-off switch.

Yes, it's true that it's the crook that's wrong; not you. But the fact of the matter is that in a metropolitan area like this, we all have a responsibility to take reasonable measures to not be an easy victim. And, as always, let's keep our eyes open for suspicious activity or persons, and call 911 immediately if you see something that doesn't seem right.

Personal responsibility and neighbors watching out for neighbors are the keys to controlling crime in our neighborhood.

Board Minutes of March 15, 2001

[Interim, prior to Board approval]

President Bernie Mayoff called the meeting to order at 7:40 PM. The minutes of the last meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: Helen Simon stated that Merrill Lynch is charging us an annual fee of \$65 for our account. This is a new charge. Helen and Bernie investigated options to avoid this service charge and recommended Vanguard Prime Money Market Fund. Lauri Wiss moved that we change from Merrill Lynch to Vanguard to save the fee. There was a second and the motion passed. New signature cards were signed. Ira Barash moved that we allow an automatic draft for metro calls. There was a second and the motion passed. We will be checking to see how many calls we receive on this number. Bernie Mayoff will check on the use of a city phone for crime watch calls.

Safety: There was one open garage theft noted and one suspicious person at a back door this month. There were no break-ins.

Development: Lauri reported on the newest businesses in the Pavillion Court. So far they include Chili's, Ross, Staples, Rack Room Shoes, A+ Flowers, Kool Cuts for Kids, Lane Bryant, and PetsMart. The new businesses in Pavillion North will be The Corner Bakery, and Alliance Title Company.

Membership: One new member joined this month. Thirteen new directory binders were delivered.

Old Business: Easter Egg Hunt – Since we do not have a coordinator, and since the Richardson Park Dept. is sponsoring two, it was decided to cancel the neighborhood Easter Egg Hunt. Volunteer Party – Bernie Mayoff will write the invitations for the party on May 5. Bylaw Revisions – Bernie Mayoff asked for feedback on the bylaws. The bylaws will appear in the May issue of the newsletter. A nominating committee will be appointed in May and a slate of officers will be published in the July and August newsletters.

New Business: Candidate's Forum – Helen Simon moved that we approve sharing the expense of a candidate forum with the Reservation Homeowners on April 19. Bernie will look into having the forum at Pearce High School. Neighborhood Yard Sale – Bill Little volunteered to head up the yard sale. This will include putting an ad in the paper, and putting up yard signs to advertise the sale. Fourth of July Parade/Picnic – Ira Barash will be our representative for this to work with the Reservation Homeowners. The next homeowner's association president's meeting will be March 20th at 7:00 a.m. Lauri plans to go with Bernie and others will go as schedules permit.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

**May 5th RISD Ballot Includes
Important Recapture Proposition

RISD residents are being asked to vote on a proposition which would save the district more than \$1 Million a year by approving Option 4 of the Texas Legislature's "recapture" mandate.

At issue is which option Richardson, a property-wealthy district, will use to share part of its tax revenues with property-poor districts. RISD currently uses Option 3, which means it sends money directly to the state where it is then redistributed.

The proposition on the May 5th ballot asks voters to consider Option 4. It will allow RISD to "partner" with a poorer district and send the money directly to that district. School officials say by using this option RISD will save \$1.4 Million.

David Tiffin, RISD Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, said under Option 3 the district is expected to pay almost \$33 Million in recapture payments this year; it is expected to increase to \$47.3 Million in 2002 and \$52.1 Million in 2003. According to Bill Smith, associate director for administration for Region 10, RISD would save money under Option 4 because 'current figures' show it gives the district a greater tax credit than will Option 3. RISD plans to work with Region 10 in finding a low-wealth school district that is a good match if Option 4 is approved. Bill Smith is currently reviewing potential districts.

As to why this proposition was not included on the March 3d school 'Bond 2001' election, district officials said they originally intended to include it as 'proposition 3'. However, they felt asking citizens to vote on the 2 propositions simplified the ballot. (The voters approved these bond propositions.) The upcoming proposition on the May 5th ballot does not involve any additional moneys from the taxpayers; it addresses a method which is more beneficial to both RISD and the partner district. Bill Smith said it is truly a 'win-win' situation for both districts

Tips on Lawns and Gardens

- ✓ Its time to get those mowers, edgers, weed eaters, and trimmers tuned up and the blades sharpened. The spring seems to be about 2 weeks late due to the cool wet weather we had during the last 2 weeks of March. It's time to fertilize those yards using a fertilizer with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio of nutrients.
- ✓ As the soil temperature warms up it will be time to put out your annuals for added color.
- ✓ Azaleas and other spring flowering shrubs can be trimmed after they bloom.
- ✓ Leave daffodil foliage to nourish the bulbs for next years bloom. Once the leaves die then it is time to remove them.
- ✓ If the buds on your roses fail to open, then check for thrips. Treat them with orthene. Aphids can also be treated with orthene.
- ✓ Caladium bulbs can be purchased now while there seems to be a good selection. Wait until the weather warms a little more before planting.
- ✓ Spray those broad leaf weeds as soon as you see them. If you let them bloom you could be letting them spread their seeds to the rest of your yard and to your neighbors.
- ✓ Dallis grass and other grassy weeds can be spot treated with Roundup or other similar products in May and June.
- ✓ Nut grass needs to be treated using a product called Image. It takes 2 treatments about a month apart to get it under control.
- ✓ Watch for fire ant mounds and treat them as they show up. There are several good insecticides for this.
- ✓ Remember to keep the hedges trimmed back from the alleys to allow clearance for your neighbors and the city trucks that use the common alley.
- ✓ Watch for those leaf munching snails and slugs. Many types of treatment are available – organic as well as pesticides.
- ✓ Use chemicals carefully. If you don't see the problem, there probably isn't the need to treat except for a pre-emergent.
- ✓ There is a TEXAS Department of Transportation Wildflower Hotline if anyone is interested in knowing the best locations to see the wonderful displays that are available. 1-800-452-9292.
