eGroups Update

The J. J. Pearce Homeowners Association eGroup is up and functioning. If you gave the Association your e-mail ID, you should have received a notice from eGroups on December 31 telling you that you are enrolled. As we described in the last newsletter, the eGroup gives us another method of communicating Crime Alert or other major news items to our members who have provided us with e-mail addresses. Now, if you see a Crime Alert sign posted at any of the entrances to the Addition, you won't have to remember to call our message phone. E-mail with the same information will be sent to you. For those members without e-mail we will still maintain the telephone alert system.

The eGroups staff did an even better job for us than we expected, but it has caused a little confusion. Because so many of us needed to join the group at once, the eGroups staff automatically enrolled everyone. This was a surprise. Normally you would need to reply to the invitation to join the group, and that is how it worked during our tests. But since they enrolled all of us automatically, you only need to reply to remove yourself from the group. We now have 163 members signed up for electronic alerts so it looks like you all worked your way through the confusion. If you didn't receive the welcome message but would like to be enrolled, please send a note to bernie@mayoff.com and we'll arrange to add you.

Crime Talk

We had two armed robberies, on our perimeter, in December. On December 16, at about 4:45 a.m., one man robbed the Whataburger on our northwest corner. He has not been apprehended. On December 20, at around 2:15 p.m., one man robbed the Bank United on our north side. The man was apprehended and arrested, here in

Richardson, a short time later. There is a very interesting article in this newsletter by one of our homeowners who was all too close to this robbery.

Last month I wrote about purse theft and wallet theft (from purses) in grocery stores and restaurants very near our neighborhood. I'm mentioning it again because it continues to happen fairly frequently. Ladies, you must keep your purse visible and/or under tight control at all times. These perpetrators are very skillful. You might want to review the article in last month's issue.

This is another reminder to be alert and on the watch for crime or suspicious activity in our neighborhood. The good news is that the rash of burglaries we had September through November seems to have subsided. The bad news is that none of us spotted any of them in progress, and no one was arrested. As I've said before, the police do not mind responding to a suspicious person or suspicious activity 911 call, as long as we just don't go crazy with it. Remember that the only calls that are useful are those that are timely. The more information you can provide the 911 operator, the better.

Have you looked at the Crime Watch portion of our JJPHOA website lately? The listing of Crime Watch Coordinators (CWCs) has been updated, and some other improvements have been made as well. Our web-master has an idea for future implementation that will make it much easier to find the CWC for your address. Also, the CWCs and their areas are listed in the 2001 JJPHOA Directory.

Now that the hectic November/December Holiday period is over, I will be arranging a get together of all our CWCs and representatives of the Richardson Police Department. We are fortunate to currently have all our CWC positions filled, but we need to rebuild enthusiasm and rigor in our Crime Watch that has waned to too low a level in the past few years. I know that our CWCs are committed to a safe neighborhood and will support this effort.

Too Close to Home !!!

Having moved from the Baylor Richardson Hospital area to the J J Pearce area in October, I have heard a great deal about attempted burglaries in our neighborhood that have kept me on my toes regarding the safety of my family, my new home, my belongings, etc. I'm grateful to have an alarm system that is closely monitored which gives me a better sense of security than I would have had otherwise. But you won't believe what happened just around the corner from our home and many of your homes this past Christmas week.

At 2:15 PM on Wed., Dec. 20, my husband, Mark, and I went to Bank United on Campbell and Mimosa to open a checking account as it would obviously be very convenient for us. The bank had but one teller and no other employees in sight. A Brinks driver was chatting with the "one" teller and left and there was only one customer in line in front of us. I inquired of the teller how we might look into opening a checking account and she stuttered. I repeated my question three times. She finally spoke clearly and told us to have a seat and someone would be out to help us shortly.

After a brief wait and only two other customers coming in and out, we were called to a side desk to visit with a young bank employee about opening an account and were facing the windows on the Blockbuster Video Store side of the bank lobby. We spoke briefly about the options we would have and the bank employee was called to the back of the bank for a brief time. She returned to inform us that "one of our tellers has just been robbed and we have to lock all the doors now." We asked if it was OK to leave and I asked the bank employee, "How do you rob a drive-thru teller?" She didn't say anything. She said we could leave and we headed across the street to the Community Credit Union, which is a bigger operation, to see about opening an account there as it is also very convenient to this neighborhood.


There we signed in, sat down and a young lady walked into the bank and did just as we did. She walked over to us to sit down and wait her turn and asked if that was us at Bank United who were sitting there when it got robbed. We said, "How did you know that?" She explained that she was walking into the bank as we were walking out of the bank. She informed us that sometime while we were in the lobby, a man came

into the bank with a gun in a bag and robbed that one and only teller who stuttered when I spoke to her initially. We would have never known that we were only feet from the bank robber, had the young female customer at Community Credit Union, not mentioned it to us.

I told my husband that we'd better go back over there in case the police needed us to give them any pertinent information. After we had talked briefly with the folks at Community Credit Union, we headed back across the street to Bank United and what was an empty place only minutes before, was suddenly a beehive of Richardson Policemen and FBI agents. We walked toward the door with a police officer standing there and I said, "That was us who was sitting here...." He was glad and surprised that we came back and had us fill out separate statements. A FBI agent questioned us, but since we didn't "see anything", she really didn't need our help. We asked the police officer if they had found the guy yet, and he said the robber was apprehended, "with all the goods" as he put it. We were amazed that their bank robber was in jail before we even got back! According to the short Dallas Morning News article the following day, police nabbed the robber at Arapaho and Presidential on the other side of town.

I walked back up to the young teller who was very calm and asked her which one in line robbed her. She said, "The guy in front of you." She described him and I absolutely didn't remember seeing him like I did the other two people that were present while we were there in the lobby.

The moral of this story is that crime is going on all around us right here in our nice new neighborhood and we don't even know it when it's happening right under our noses. I'm always more cautious this time of year anyway, but my Bank United adventure was literally "too close to home"!!!!!!

Membership Drive Success

The membership drive for 2001 is officially completed. The counts are as follow through December 31, 2000.

Thanks again for joining our 2001 membership drive. This year's drive has been a success. To date, we are 97.9% of last year's numbers with 72.6% of the households represented.

The letter that I sent to all members at the beginning of September to solicit corrections was a success. I received about 30 telephone calls and emails (10.6% of the letters sent) for corrections.

The name and address directories have been sent to 332 members. If your name is not included in the directory, it is because we sent the list to the printer on December 20th. There were 326 members listed in the directory. For those of you who are not listed, we are going to attach an update page in an upcoming newsletter. For those of you who were added after December 29th, I will forward either a red notebook or inserts to you by the end of January 2001.

There were 109 members who requested new red notebooks. If you need a red notebook, let me know. If you have more than one red notebook, please bring the extra one(s) to my house. Do not return the older blue notebooks with 1/2 inch rings. The new red notebooks have 1-inch rings.

I have received eight packets out of 18 from the block captains. I am expecting the remainder by the end of January 2001.

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Unusual Events . . . or Are They?

I think it's important that we inform each other so as not to let our guard down just because we're close to our homes.

A few weeks before we moved over here, I was at Tom Thumb on Campbell and Coit one morning around 9:30 AM. A Pearce High School mom (who lives in the Parkhill area) stood out in front of the store letting every one that entered know that her purse was stolen right out of her basket in the produce department. She just turned away from the shopping cart for a brief time. Her purse was even in the basket tucked up in the area under the child seat. The guy stole everything: her driver's license, her cell phone, her billfold, her credit cards, you name it. I told her she had better call the police again as this guy knew where she lived now and knew her home was "easy prey" with her being stranded at the grocery store. She called her Pearce High School football player son at school to go home and guard the house until the police arrived. Sure enough, the guy had made an attempt to rob her home! I had never met this lady before this particular day, but after that, I ran into her numerous times at either Albertson's or at the Pearce football games, and we delicately joked about the purse incident nearly each time we ran into each other. Crime is all around us and we need to keep our guard up no matter where we are.

After reading in the newsletter about the suspicious persons' ringing neighborhood doorbells to check if people are home, I now talk to strangers who arrive on my doorstep through my glass door rather than even opening it. They can see my security system pad by the front door, so they know I'm "on guard" so to speak.

Another incident happened recently in this area to some close friends of ours who moved Nov. 29 to a home on El Pastel (which turns into Chickasaw on this side of Coit). On Friday, December 8th, the two back doors to their house were kicked in between 2 PM and 4:45 PM when their son, who turned 15 the next day, arrived home from school. Many valuables were taken from their "new" home and it is possible that their son arrived when the perpetrators were still in the if it was "next". The father of the house and his married daughter had been in the house around 2, so the time frame of the burglary was very tight. My son's friend was horrified to come home to this discovery in a new area, but was fortunate to find a nearby neighbor at home to run to for immediate help.


You also no doubt heard about the abandoned 2-hour-old baby boy on the doorstep on Campbell Court (at Cap Rock) which occurred on November 24? Our old house was on Cap Rock and is just about five houses from the Nassiris' home where the baby was dropped off the night after Thanksgiving around 8:30 PM when it was rainy and 49 degrees. My youngest son plays with the Nassiri children almost weekly, so that event also touched our lives in recent weeks. The Nassiris were interviewed on various news broadcasts the following Monday, Live! Mrs. Nassiri said the media was camped out in front of her house that day from 3 PM until nearly midnight. I found that pretty strange since the baby was found on Friday evening.

In retrospect, I guess you could say this has been a rather unusual year for my family, especially these past five weeks! I hope that all who read this will learn from these events to be careful wherever they may go, as well as to be very aware when they are in their homes that would-be robbers are casing neighborhoods like ours and are watching our comings and goings.

I guess we **ALL** need to know who our Crime Watch Coordinator is for our block. I am home most of the time, so I always keep a close watch on the neighborhood and can help inform him/her of any strange goings on. I seem to be a magnet for unusual events lately!

About two weeks later, there were tracks that showed someone had jumped the curb to drive through our driveway and drove with only one side of their tires on the driveway, the other being driven far into the grass. Shortly after that I witnessed a large pickup truck backing blindly into our snow-covered driveway after dark. Lastly, I was in my car facing east about to pull out of my driveway, when a woman in a van pulled right up into my driveway nose to nose with me. She could plainly see that I was coming out of my driveway about to exit, yet she waved and backed out and parked two doors down at 1303 Chesterton. Unbelievable!

Does any resident in our neighborhood have a circular drive problem as well? Right now we are trying to work out a solution to this problem as our yard is slowly being destroyed by inconsiderate drivers who find it okay to use our grass as their turnaround lane. Richardson's Neighborhood Vitality Program

The city recently provided us with an update on the Neighborhood Vitality Program. This program was established as part of the 1997 Bond Program and included \$7.4M over a six year time frame to enhance and improve the appearance of the city. Project requests were received from Homeowners Associations and other neighborhood representatives in 1998 and 1999, and include such things as walls, entry features, bridge aesthetics and sidewalks. Many of us have noticed the new walls on both sides of Arapaho that are part of the Neighborhood Vitality Program. (We talked about sidewalks in the last newsletter.)

During the first three years of the Program the city has completed 3,300 linear feet of masonry screening walls, and another 2,900 linear feet are nearing completion. Three entry features in southwest Richardson are also nearing completion. During the process the city has also established the means to manage the Program and gained experience in ways to gather the most cost-effective bids for projects. The newest developments in the city have many of these features built-in during construction and the Neighborhood Vitality Program is allowing us to keep the entire city looking fresh and vibrant.

Next in the list of projects for the Program are 25 entry features, seven wall and landscape projects, and 17 bridge projects. All should fit within the available resources. The Neighborhood Vitality staff has identified three additional locations where screening walls would be desirable but that fall outside of existing funding. Alternatives are now being explored to fund these additional walls. It is even possible that the Program will be able to solicit additional project requests in the Fall. As we hear more about progress, or any call for new project nominations, we will keep you informed.

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The Crime Prevention Corner

This is the first of a four part series. This first "Corner" will deal with a very important topic; protecting kids from crime and violence. Source material is compliments of the National Crime Prevention Council.

Protecting Kids from Crime and Violence

Would your child know what to do if...

- He/she got lost at a shopping mall?
- A nice-looking, friendly stranger offered him/her a ride home after school?
- A friend dared him/her to drink some beer or smoke a joint?
- The baby sitter or neighbor wanted to play a secret game?

A great thing about kids is their natural trust in people, especially in adults. It's sometimes hard for parents to teach children to balance this trust with caution. But kids today need to know common sense rules that can help keep them safe, and build the self-confidence they need to handle emergencies.

Start with the basics.

- Make sure your children know their full name, address (city and state, and their phone number with area code.
- Be sure kids know to call 911 or "0" in emergencies and how to use a public phone. Practice making emergency calls with a make believe phone.
- Tell your children to never accept rides or gifts from someone they and you don't know well.
- Teach children to go to a store clerk, security guard, or police officer for help if lost in a mall or store, or on the street.
- Set a good example with your own actions; lock doors and windows, and check to see who's there before opening the door.
- Take time to listen carefully to your children's fears and feelings about people and places; especially ones that scare them or
- Make them feel uneasy. Tell them to trust their instincts when something frightens or troubles them.

Did You Know?

Have you ever wondered about the little blue signs around the city noting an historic marker site? I have, but I never took the time to check them out. I have lived in Richardson for the past 35 years and like many, I never took the time to investigate them. I had seen only two, so when I went to the *Texas Historic Site Atlas* website, I was surprised to find that there are actually eight in our city!

Each month I will tell you about one, and maybe it will inspire some of you to go by and take a look for yourself and learn a little more about our city. It might also be a good way to enlighten children and give them some history of their city. I will start with one that many of you may already know about.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF RICHARDSON

1001 N. Central Expressway at Arapaho Road. (Enter the church parking lot at the first entrance north of Arapaho, from Richardson Drive. The marker is located in front of the church sanctuary, on the south side of the building.)

Marker Text: Founded in 1865 with nineteen charter members, this congregation began as Mt.

Calvary Baptist Church. Early worship services were held in the Elm Grove Schoolhouse. The Rev. J. J. Butler was called as first pastor of the congregation. William Huffhines, a charter member of the church and an early Dallas County pioneer, donated two acres of land for a sanctuary. Also located on the land was Mt. Calvary Cemetery. A frame sanctuary was built in 1868 and the congregation continued to meet there until 1885, when they voted to move five miles north to the new town of Richardson. Philemon W. and Mary Huffhines gave land at the corner of Greenville Avenue and Phillips Street for a sanctuary, which was completed in 1886. After it was destroyed in a storm in 1909, a new brick structure was completed on the same site in 1910. The brick building was replaced in 1953 and one year later the congregation voted to change its name to First Baptist Church of Richardson. Over the years, First Baptist Church has served the community with a variety of outreach programs. This site was acquired in 1976, and a new sanctuary was dedicated in February 1987.

I will profile other historic sites in upcoming newsletters. I hope you will enjoy this column.
